# Peace Officer Deaths On The Rise

With the economic downturn, peace officers are placed at greater risk due to public frustration with the economy, work layoffs, families struggling with financial woes and an increase in depression and anxiety by the general public as a whole. The National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund reported a 20 percent rise in officer deaths in the first half of 2009. Sixty-six officers lost their lives in the line of duty — of which 21 were shot to death. Could the change in the economy be fueling the increase in peace officers' deaths? Is this just a fluke or a disturbing trend?

On March 21, four Oakland police officers lost their lives in two separate shootouts with a wanted parolee willing to die before going back to prison. On April 4, three Pittsburgh police officers were shot and killed responding to a domestic violence call. In Florida, two deputy sheriffs were shot and killed while attempting to arrest a man for domestic violence. I can recall when attacking a peace officer was considered a death wish and few, even the hard-core criminals, dared to try to kill a cop. Are people at their wits' end or has society (and our government) failed to protect the officers who valiantly serve their communities?

There are things we cannot control like deranged individuals set on killing cops, but we can take precautions to protect ourselves. If you are a supervisor, you should talk about at least one officer survival topic at every briefing to remind our folks of the dangers of the job. If you are rank and file (the folks on the front lines, whether on the streets, in the courts, or in the jails), you should prepare each and every day as if you could face a life-and-death situation that day. You should mentally and physically prepare yourself for survival. These are things we control.

Government has a part in protecting the lives of officers as well, and they have failed miserably. I am very disappointed in Governor Schwarzenegger's proposal to release 22,000 state prisoners (by the time you read this, the deal may already have been made). I guess he is operating under the assumption that these criminals will no longer commit any crimes (which they have been doing since age 10), that they will not get rearrested (defying the recidivism rate of 70 percent, which by the way is the highest in the nation) and that they will get jobs and pay taxes (yeah, that'll happen) thus solving the economic crisis. He is also proposing cutting short the sentences of undocumented immigrants serving time in the state prison. Lisa Page, Schwarzenegger's spokesperson, stated, "Every dollar not spent to house an undocumented immigrant inmate is a dollar that can be spent on health care services and education and

other important programs to Californians." WHAT? Does Arnold not remember that an "undocumented immigrant" stood over Deputy David March and shot him to death at point-blank range? Is he saying that health care (by the way, much of that health care is for undocumented immigrants) is more important than keeping our streets safe? It is clear that the governor's agenda places health care and education before public safety. I am not saying that public safety should be excluded from budget talks. All I am saying is that public safety must be the number one priority to the governor and it is pretty clear that is not the case. It's like a pet dog. When times were good, they bought it a rhinestone collar, gave it pretty booties to protect its paws, got the best pet psychic and a top-notch dog therapist for weekly sessions. When times got bad, they decided to save money by cutting off the dog's food supply instead of cutting out the superfluous crap! Like the dog food, public safety is critical to keeping California alive. Without it, we will have pretty parks that nobody feels safe to play in. We will have schools with gold-plated books, but gangsters running the playgrounds. We will have health care for all, and they will need it for the increase in gunshot victims and beatings. *Public safety must come first!* (Sorry, that was a long way to go to make my point!)

Our own sheriff and the Board of Supervisors are not exempt from the same criticisms. There have been recent talks about closing a jail in order to meet budget cuts. Some believe it is posturing by the sheriff, and some believe that the County has failed to put public safety at the forefront of their agenda. Frankly, it doesn't matter what the reason is. The bottom line is the release of prisoners will send a message that public safety is not a priority to our local government leaders. The sheriff and the Board must come up with other solutions. More criminals on the streets means more crime and greater risk to our personnel. In addition, I urge the sheriff not to cut training and equipment budgets. It is a simplistic solution to saving money in the short run, but it will cost us in the long run (maybe with our lives!). With the rise in crime inevitable, our personnel need training to keep their skill levels high, and they need all the available tools to make their jobs safer. Now is not the time to skimp in these areas.

While I'm talking about officer safety, I have to address the proposal to absorb the Office of Public Safety (OPS) into the Sheriff's Department which

# Unemployment is Skyrocketing, Economy is an Unholy Mess: Happy Labor Day, America

What a difference a year makes! Last year as Labor Day approached, gasoline prices were high — but no one expected the impending meltdown of our financial system in the U.S. Yes, Bear Stearns and Indy Mac had collapsed and were subsequently bought by JP Morgan Chase, but conventional wisdom said that they had brought their demise upon themselves by using questionable business practices.

After Labor Day, everything changed. In rapid succession, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac were taken over by the federal government; Merrill Lynch, Lehman Brothers and Washington Mutual all failed; and insurance giant AIG only avoided failure after an \$85 billion infusion of cash from the Federal Reserve. Shortly thereafter, General Motors and Chrysler declared bankruptcy and Americans lost their confidence in our capitalist system. After all, if GM — once the largest corporation in the world — could fail, where does that leave the rest of us? In short order, banks stopped lending money, foreclosures skyrocketed, everyday Americans stopped spending money on anything but the bare essentials and the economy went into freefall.

Now, according to the Volatility Index (VIX), which tracks the fear of investors in the stock market, we are experiencing the worst investor fear factor in the history of the Index. The index, which is used worldwide to measure market fears and expectations, is at an all-time high on the “investor fear gauge” and twice as high as the historical average. This fear led to the third worst stock market loss in U.S. history in 2008: over 35 percent. U.S. stocks’ value dropped by over \$7 trillion dollars in 2008, and the losses continued into 2009.

We are now officially 21 months into the longest recession in 75 years, surpassing major recessions in 1982–1983 and 1975. This has led to the worst job losses in 53 years. The U.S. lost 2.6 million jobs in 2008 — mostly after Labor Day. Now, 14.5 million Americans are unemployed, or approximately 9.5 percent of us. In California the numbers are the worst since 1976. Almost 2.2 million Californians, or 11.5 percent of us, are unemployed. This of course does not include those who have stopped looking or who have underemployed themselves to keep food on the table. In fact many are working part time, which accounts for the lowest average hours worked in history — down to 33.5 hours per week.

The downturn has begun to affect public employees in a big way throughout the state. Currently, the governor has furloughed most state employees three days per month, which equals an almost 14 percent pay cut, and he is asking for an additional 5 percent pay cut in his budget. Thousands of school teachers and school employees have been given layoff notices. Even our brethren in public safety have begun to feel the pain. San Bernardino County deputies gave back their guaranteed raises this year; police officers in Monrovia are facing furloughs; and Sacramento County is preparing to lay off 215 deputy sheriffs.

In addition, public employee pensions and retiree health care continue to be under attack statewide and in various agencies across the state. Add to this mix the constantly increasing medical premiums (far in excess of the inflation rate) and you have public employment in California that is no longer secure on any front. To our advantage, L.A. County is in better shape than most public agencies in the state — a tribute to the fine work done by the Board of Supervisors and the County CEO over these past few years. Too often we attack these people without giving credit when it is due. So far we have avoided layoffs, furloughs and pay cuts in large part due to the efforts of the Board of Supervisors, the CEO and their staffs. Let us hope that the state budget, when and if it is finalized, does not undo their hard work.

So as we approach Labor Day 2009, we find our nation, our state and our County in much different shape than last year. Many more people are out of a job, have lost their home, have seen their 401k’s or net worth decline precipitously, or at the very least are forced to live on less in their paychecks. Labor Day — the only national holiday dedicated to the working men and women in America — must take on additional significance this year. For those of us still working in good jobs, it is time for us to pause and reflect on the plight of those less fortunate, to say a prayer for them and wish them well. It is time for us to demand that our politicians in Sacramento and Washington, D.C., stop fighting among themselves and to start working for the common good instead of staking out purely partisan positions. It is time for the corporations (think oil companies) to stop charging all that the traffic will bear and to work towards rebuilding America. It is time

## Supervisors, Watch Commanders & After-Hour Incidents by Marlyne Rinaldi, PPOA Sr. Labor Representative

Before you became a supervisor, you only had to worry about yourself (and your partner). Now it’s not only your action/inaction, but all those you supervise as well. That’s a big job, with (potentially) big consequences. It is disconcerting to hear about it on the news, sometimes hours later. Always call PPOA at (323) 261-3010. If it’s after 5:00 p.m., advise the answering service that you need to speak to a labor rep.

# Inmate Who Possessed Hard, Plastic Object Sharpened on One End Did Not Necessarily Possess “Sharpened Object”

The case below was decided by the California Courts of Appeal and looks at the law relating to possession of a sharp instrument while confined in a penal institution. Penal Code section 4502(a) states, in part, “Every person who, while at or confined in any penal institution ... possesses or carries upon his or her person or had under his or her custody or control any instrument or weapon of the kind commonly known as blackjack, slungshot, billy, sandclub, sandbag, or metal knuckles, any explosive substance, or fixed ammunition, any dirk or dagger or sharp instrument, any pistol, revolver, or other firearm, or any tear gas or tear gas weapon, is guilty of a felony ...” Under what circumstances may an object be considered a “sharp instrument” within the meaning of section 4502(a)?

Recently, the Third District Court of Appeal looked at this question in the case of *People v. Hayes* (2009) 171 Cal. App. 4<sup>th</sup> 549.

In the *Hayes* case, James Hayes was a state prison inmate in Sacramento County. One fall day, a correctional officer conducted a search of Hayes’ cell, which he shared with another inmate. During the search, the correctional officer conducted a strip search of Hayes. When Hayes removed his boxer shorts, the officer observed that the shorts contained a black object tied with string to the fly of the shorts. The object was hard plastic, about three and one-half inches long, rounded on one end, and sharpened to a point on the other end. The correctional officer considered the object to be a weapon because it was sharpened to a point, could be gripped with the point protruding, and would not be detected by metal-detecting wands.

Hayes was charged with violating Penal Code section 4502(a) by possessing a sharp instrument. He took his case to a jury trial.

At trial, a correctional officer testified about his actions and about the object. He testified that the object was a “sharp point.” While on the witness stand, the officer put on gloves and the prosecutor had the officer hold up one layer of glove and push the object into it. The glove

was partially shredded. Another correctional officer, who was present during the search, testified that the object could be used as a stabbing weapon that could stab someone’s throat or arm.

Hayes testified that he made the object by melting down a compact disc case in order to create a screwdriver to work on his radio and cassette player and then remolded it so that he could clean his toenails. He testified that he put the object in his underwear because he knew it might be confiscated as contraband.

He was convicted by the jury. He was sentenced to serve 25 years to life in state prison.

Hayes then appealed his conviction to the Court of Appeal. The Court of Appeal reviewed Hayes’ case and overturned his conviction.

In its written decision, the Court ruled that the jury had been given a misleading instruction by the judge, who told the jury, “A sharp instrument is an instrument that can be used to inflict injury and that is not necessary for the inmate to have in his possession.”

The Court stated, “The first step in statutory analysis is to examine the actual words of the statute, giving them a common sense meaning. We think it obvious that, to be a ‘sharp instrument’ under section 4502, the object must be sharp. This does not necessarily mean the object must have a cutting blade, like a knife or razor blade. A pointed object may qualify as ‘sharp.’ [Hayes’] appeal does not require us to define all ways in which an instrument may be ‘sharp.’ We merely observe that among the ways in which items can be sharp are sharpened points as well as cutting blades.”

The Court continued, “We conclude the instruction [to the jury] was erroneous in defining ‘sharp instrument’ in a way that allowed the jurors to find defendant guilty even if they did not believe the item was ‘sharp’ as that term is commonly used. The instruction removed from the jury’s consideration an element of the offense: that the weapon be ‘sharp.’”

The Court’s ruling in the *Hayes* case pointed out (no pun intended) that law enforcement officers, prosecutors and judges must look carefully at the elements of the crime to make certain that the facts of the case meet all of the elements. PPOA

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# California Supreme Court Clarifies, Somewhat, Rules Governing Public Employee Participation in Ballot Measure Campaigns

On April 20, 2009, the California Supreme Court decided *Vargas v. City of Salinas*, which set guidelines on when and how local governments may express their positions on ballot measures. Local governments may provide the public with information, including information explaining the consequences of passage or failure of the measure, so long as the activity is not "traditional campaign activity." The Court said a local government's actions are traditional campaign activity if they are in the form of traditional campaign activities or if their style, tenor and timing suggest that they are campaign activities and not public informational efforts.

Supervisory and nonsupervisory public employees are often called upon to participate in agency activities related to ballot measures. The Court expressly found that this was permissible and that it was acceptable for a local government to authorize an agency employee to present the agency's view of a measure at a public meeting, as well as the meeting of a private organization. As public employees, PPOA members may be called upon to participate in such activities. Since the Court's standard for traditional campaign activity is vague, the following examples may be of assistance in understanding where the line of traditional campaign activity is.

## EXAMPLES OF ACCEPTABLE INFORMATIONAL ACTIVITIES

- Slide presentations prepared by city agencies at city council meetings describing the program reductions that will result if a measure is passed. The city may post on its website the slide presentations from the council meetings and detailed meeting minutes summarizing the speakers' statements.
- Posting reports on the Internet by local agency personnel regarding a measure's potential impact.
- Producing a one-page summary describing the measure and related factual information regarding its effects. The city may make available copies of the summary (in various languages) in the city clerk's office and in city libraries. The summary may advise readers where they can obtain further information, but it should not tell people how to vote.

- Including articles regarding the measure in its regular (not special edition) quarterly newsletter mailed to all city residents. The newsletter should not tell people how to vote, and the style and tenor of any articles should be fact-based and consistent with a municipal newsletter.

- Providing a fair presentation of the facts in response to a request for information.

Upon request, a city may authorize an agency employee to present the agency's view of a measure at a private or public organization's meeting.

A school district may spend money to broadcast a school board meeting at which board members adopt a resolution opposing an initiative, if persons with opposing viewpoints are allowed to speak and all board meetings are broadcast.

A district attorney and a sheriff who are provided cars and drivers for security reasons may use the cars to attend a meeting supporting an initiative.

## EXAMPLES OF UNACCEPTABLE CAMPAIGN ACTIVITIES

- Bumper stickers, posters or parade floats.
- Mass media advertisements.
- Door-to-door canvassing on paid time.
- Disseminating campaign literature prepared by private proponents or opponents of a measure.
- Posting billboards throughout a city stating in large letters the facilities that will close if a given measure is passed.

These examples are far from exhaustive. If you have questions about whether the activities you have been assigned are permissible, you should make sure you are clear about what you are being asked to do and if you still have questions, you may want to consult your PPOA representative. PPOA

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has dragged on for years. The Board of Supervisors need to make a decision one way or the other. "Sh@! or get off the pot!" These poor folks at OPS are caught in limbo. Their management doesn't want to spend the money in training or hiring in anticipation of a merger. ## Attention Members Eligible for PPOA Donning & Doffing Lawsuit: DO NOT SIGN Lockhart Class Action Forms

An attorney named Greg Petersen is once again attempting to push his own version of the "Donning & Doffing" lawsuit. His suit is known as the "Lockhart" case. This case involves only seven individuals as Plaintiffs, and does not have other opt-in class members. The Lockhart case nearly settled for these seven persons, but that settlement fell apart, and as of July 13, 2009, Mr. Petersen has asked the Court to order that a Court-approved Notice is mailed to potential class members so that numerous individuals will have the chance to join or "opt-in" to this Lockhart case. This Notice is likely to be mailed out in late July or early August.

Be advised that if you receive this Lockhart Notice, which presents the opportunity to join or opt-in to that lawsuit, you should not sign the opt-in form. The PPOA lawsuit already covers the donning and doffing issue for you if you are one of the more than 700 individuals who has already opted in to the PPOA case. If you have not yet opted-in to the PPOA case, contact PPOA immediately (800) 747-7762 to get an opt-in form.

In other words, DO NOT SIGN THE LOCKHART CLASS ACTION OPT-IN FORMS since the PPOA case already covers the donning & doffing matter.

Well before Mr. Petersen's push to 'revive' the Lockhart case, PPOA developed a plan to resolve this issue and greatly assist our efforts to improve your salary contract during the next round of negotiations. This plan is solid, both legally and contractually. To have it compromised by any of our members joining this unrelated and duplicative Lockhart lawsuit may cause a serious (and potentially costly) disservice to our members.

Again, DO NOT join the Lockhart case, and please tell all of your co-workers, including deputies, to refuse to sign any forms associated with the Lockhart case being pushed by Greg Petersen. Please contact PPOA if you have any questions on the donning & doffing lawsuit or the Lockhart case.

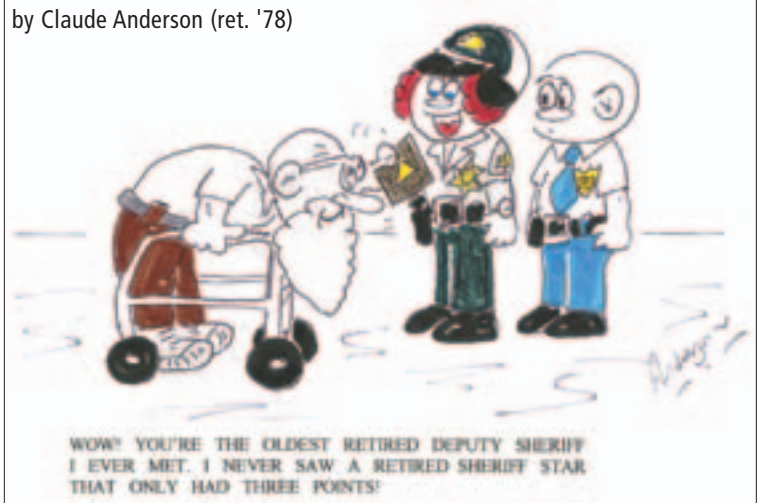

# Financial Planning: The Savings Component, Part 2 of 3

Dear PPOA members:

In the last issue we discussed the Protection Component of a financial plan. We want to make sure you and your families are protected due to liabilities, disability and death. In this issue we will discuss the Savings Component of a financial plan and the role it plays in overall gathering wealth and assets.

## CHECKING ACCOUNT

Your checking account is nothing but a revolving door in your total financial plan. It is a distribution point that pays all the bills and transfers the discretionary incomes to the rest of your plan. If you are married and maintain one checking account, we suggest you balance the account together once a week or maintain individual checking accounts.

## SAVINGS ACCOUNT

This is the first bucket to fill in your savings component. How much cash is necessary to have? We recommend cash holdings equal to 6 months of your salary and available to you at all times. In case of a real emergency or loss of income, we need to have immediate liquidity and that usually gives us time to make better decisions since we have less pressure. Check with PPOA Credit Union for rates and it makes sense to shop around. **DO NOT USE THE IRS AS A SAVINGS ACCOUNT.** Many people like and look forward to receiving big tax refund checks from the IRS. In reality, by over paying, you are letting our beloved Uncle keep your money for the entire tax year and then go back and prove the money belongs to you. You may receive a check after you file (we hope), but you miss out on any interest that money may have earned. The idea is to claim in a way that your tax withholdings cover your tax liabilities and you receive nothing or very little after you file. This gives you more control and may allow you to take advantage of other investment opportunities during the tax year. You need to talk to your CPA or accountant and they can give you the formula based on your total income and the number of dependants in your household.

## CERTIFICATE OF DEPOSIT

Once the emergency bucket is funded, then we are ready to steer assets to other savings components. CD rates are usually in correlation with inflation.

Today, we are complaining about CD rates being so low, but we also have to consider the inflation rate, which is less than 1 percent. In the early 80's, CD rates averaged 12 percent per year and inflation was between 12 to 13 percent during the same time. So, the net results were negative for most people. This vehicle is most effective when used as a short-term strategy (6 to 12 months) and it is designed as a holding tank for future expenses or investments.

## TAX DEFERRED ACCOUNTS

For those of you that want minimum risk associated with your accounts and may want to defer taxes for later years, annuities (offered by insurance companies) could be an alternative to CD's. You defer the taxes until you use the money and there may be penalties on withdrawals prior to age 59 1/2. Your age, risk tolerance and investment timeline can determine the best use of this vehicle.

## DEFERRED COMP (457) PLAN

Please, if you are not contributing to your deferred comp plan, drop everything and make the call immediately. This is free money and your contributions are being matched fully up to 3 percent. I know most of you are systematically putting money away for your retirement and you will reap the benefits as long as you manage your risk along the way. Most companies in the private sector have stopped contributing to their employees 401K plan due to lower profits or even losses. As far as I know, LA County has no intention of such move (I hope they continue to do so) and that could mean additional hundreds of thousands of dollars at retirement plus your retirement income. Your contributions are tax deductible and you can borrow against it if you have to.

Having the Savings Component at its optimum, allows us to feel confident about our overall finances and that can lead to better investment decision. In the next issue, we will talk in detail about the Growth Component as well as college savings plans. You may contact us by calling PPOA offices in San Dimas.
